

MEMORIES



FROM THE EYE OF THE CAMEL

Gary, "Marie, I've been offered a job to Manage the Operations and Maintenance of an ammonia plant in Egypt. Should we go?"

When Marie said, "Yes", they didn't realize that they were about to embark on the best adventure of their life! Gary asked the senior management of KBR (Kellogg Brown and Root) if Egypt was safe for Americans, safe for Christians and safe for women. The answer was yes for all these questions since the Egyptians were the calmest people and never asked tough questions to their government and leaders.

Gary arrived in Egypt on Jan 19, 2011 and headed for Stella di Mare, an Italian Golf Resort on the Red Sea. He called Marie to let her know that he was safe in a beautiful and peaceful place. Marie's responsibility then was to organize the move out of the leased home in PA and store all the possessions in a local storage facility.

One week later on Jan 26 while Marie, back in Pennsylvania, was in the bedroom sorting out the 200 pounds of personal possessions allowed, CNN had a news flash showing Cairo's revolution as part of the Arab Spring movement. Police shooting Egyptians and vice versa, the Army who reported directly to Mubarak shooting towards the Police. Every Friday after prayers it was violent. At one point a worker at the Stella De Mari hotel basically dared a soldier surrounding the hotel to shoot him, which he did. That word got to the hotel and Gary basically took over the action plan for the hotel. Shut all the lights, lock all the doors, strike the US flag, make announcements to entire hotel guests, get the KBR Corporate Safety team back in Houston to arrange transport to the airport and subsequent air travel.

Gary called soon afterwards telling Marie that he was flying with his expatriate crew to the safe haven of England at midnight. Gary gave his team 10 minutes to pack essentials and be ready to leave for airport. Utter chaos at the airport, wall-to-wall people, no directions, no plan, people getting knocked down in the scuffle and then laying on the floor in tears. The metal detector archway had been knocked over and was out of service.

A Security guard was happy to take almost all the cash Gary had in order to allow his team to get through. CNN had a field day with sensationally exaggerated fake news. The family became very worried about Gary's safety as well as Marie's if she traveled to Egypt. Tense times.

Gary was allowed by KBR security to travel back to Cairo after three weeks in London. Marie wasn't sure if she would ever see a pyramid or get to ride a camel.

However, 2 months later, Marie arrived in Egypt, greeted by Gary and their personal driver/ guard, Mohammed. As they headed out to the desert for an hour and a half drive, their car whizzed past many unusual sites. Imagine a bike rider with a basket of bread on his head dodging chaotic traffic and trucks loaded with camels; buses passing by within inches; cars heading for them...Marie wondering," Where are the lanes?" She soon would find out that there are no driving lanes or people lining up anywhere in Egypt. Could this be because of the poor education and the disorganized society promoted by the government?

After the long drive passing by nothing but wind carved sand mountains, abandoned burned out cars, a few concrete benches and a couple of deserted concrete structures, they asked Mohammed, "Where are the gas stations? Towns? Stores?"

As their car pulled up to the enormous white concrete walls that surrounded Stella Di Mare, Mohammed stopped at the security gate. The guards came out to check the car with mirrors to look under the car and peek inside the car. Over

the next year and a half, this security practice happened every time that we pulled up to a hotel, mall, public building or parking lot. (Something that we should think about doing here in the U.S.)

Driving forward through the gate, the scenery became astonishingly serene! You can look up this Italian Resort located in Ain Sokhna: Stelladimare.com

Living at Stella di Mare was magical...towel toys and flower petals EVERYDAY!

The Stella Di Mare hotel was one of three hotels in the complex that were surrounded by many villas, flowering gardens, pools, a wellness spa, and access to the private beach resort. Missing, were the people! Because of the revolution, Gary and his team were the only guests staying at the hotel.

Marie was able to make friends with a few Italian visitors from the Villas and enjoyed tea in the afternoons with the locals out in the hotel souk markets.











Due to the lack of visitors, Marie and Gary were treated like royalty. Breakfast delivered in their room each morning and dinner in a formal dining room each night with entertainment. The waiters taught them Arabic and they taught the nightly Egyptian singer how to sing American songs by Patsy Cline!

Gary would head out to work while Marie put on her uniform, a bathing suit, and headed to the spa and beach. The Thalassa Spa is built as a replica of Cleopatra's Temple and most days Marie was the only person on the beach! Gary was able to golf 3 to 4 times a week and Marie helped the pros with local tournaments. Gary got his first hole in one! And won many trophies.

The food was authentic middle eastern, and the hotel chefs prepared many varieties of gourmet dinners. The hotel chef invited Marie into the kitchen to teach him how to cook Gary's favorite chicken. From then on, "Gary's Chicken" was on the dinner menu at least once a week!

The only thing that Marie had to cook was Starbucks Coffee in the French press with kettle-boiled bottled water. Mohammed would take Marie to The Mall in Cairo weekly, especially so that she could get the needed coffee. Starbucks in Egypt? Oh yes, and Kentucky Fried Chicken and Pizza Hut. Huge favorites of most Egyptians!

The body images were very different from Western civilization. The fatter your wife is, the more affluent is the husband!

If you go to Egypt, make sure to stop at the Duty-Free airport shop for real booze. The only alcohol sold in Egypt is in plain glass bottles with black labels; mystery booze!

Gary was not sure how long the work assignment would continue, so he and Marie took advantage of many side trips very soon after their arrival.

There were Felucca rides, and a 4-day cruise down the Nile to the 5000-year-old temples in the Valleys of the Kings and Queens and special spices of Luxor.











The Pyramids, of course!

First and last time; Marie will never ride on Camel. Next time, when son Jason came for a visit, Marie was on a horse instead! There was also a special armeguarded trip to Sharm El Sheikh and a hike up Mt. Sinai.





While in Sheikh they watched The Wedding of Prince William and Catherine on the beach in a British Bar. Soon to find out that Osama Bin Laden was killed that day by Americans.



Marie's blonde hair did not help her to blend well. She turned heads in most places and was chased by locals who wanted to have their picture taken with her.

This was the best foreign assignment by far! It was a chance of a lifetime to live for over a year peacefully amongst the very friendly Egyptians who were as curious about us as we were about them. If the world becomes a calmer place, we recommend going to Egypt on a guided tour. There are excursions that fly you into Cairo and whisk you to a hotel overlooking the Pyramids with a fantastic light show. The Sphinx lights up and talks to you! Then they fly you down to Aswan, where you will be put on a 4-day mini cruise down the Nile. Each day you are taken on private tours into the 5000-year-old Valleys of the Kings and Queens. You will end up in the ancient village of Luxor, remarkably unchanged over time. Hope that some of you will be able to enjoy this experience! Don't forget the kettle and coffee press!
